



Myanmar Weekly Conflict Update (July 1- 7, 2025)

Violence Against Civilians

Civilian Casualtie

28 civilians, including four children and two women, lost their lives due to air and artillery strikes by the Military Council in Seven States and Regions of Myanmar.

Civilian’s Houses Burnt Down

85 houses were reported to have been burned down by Military Council troops across two states and one region in Myanmar. This included 45 houses in the Sagaing Region, 30 in Kachin State, and 10 in Southern Shan State.

Civilian Arrest

81 civilians were detained across one state and three regions in Myanmar. The breakdown of arrests includes 45 individuals in Northern Shan State, 19 in Sagaing Region, 16 in Yangon Region, and 1 in Mandalay Region.

Aerial Assaults Against Civilian Targets

The Military Council carried out 52 airstrikes across one state and four regions in Myanmar. This included 24 airstrikes in Mandalay Region, 17 in Sagaing Region, 7 in Karenni State, 3 in Magway Region, and 1 in Tanintharyi Region.

Conflicts and Casualties of Combatants

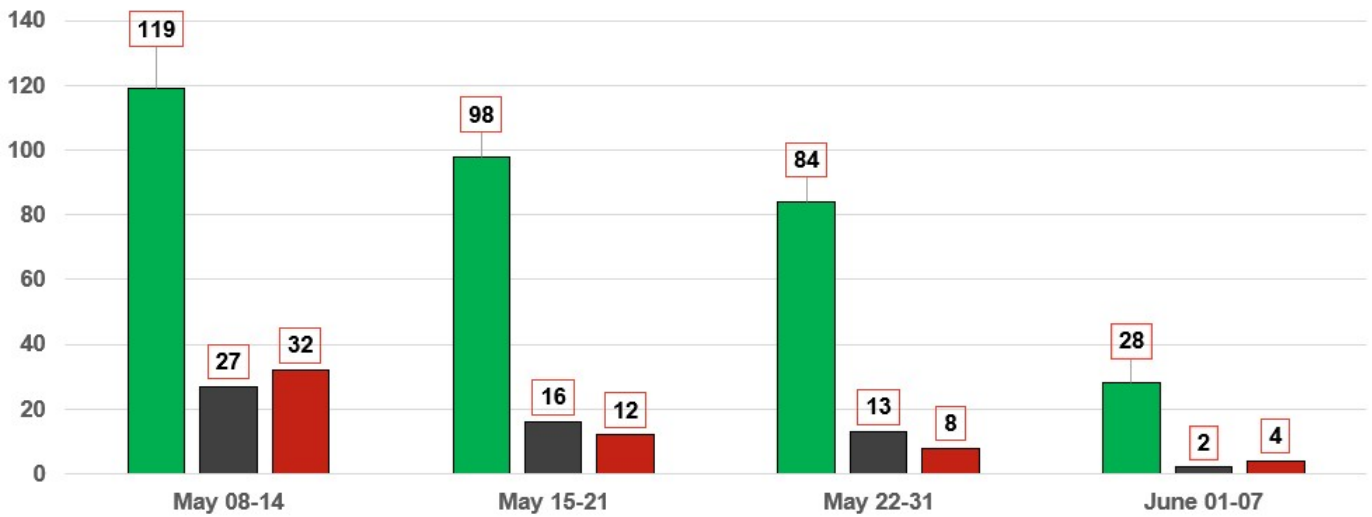
A total of 38 clashes occurred, both major and minor, including incidents involving drone strikes. The Sagaing Region saw the highest number of clashes, with 11 incidents, followed by the Tanintharyi Region with 6 incidents. The Magway Region experienced 5 incidents, while the Bago Region had 4. Rakhine State and Mandalay Region each recorded 3 incidents. Additionally, Karenni State and Southern Shan State both had 2 incidents, and Karen State and Mon State reported 1 incident each. No fighting was reported in Northern Shan State, Yangon Region, Chin State, Irrawaddy Region, or Kachin State.

In these conflicts, 195 soldiers of the Military Council and 3 individuals from the Revolutionary Joint Force were killed.

All information provided is based on local news reports published between June 1st and 07th 2025.

Military Developments

Operation by AA and Joint Forces

On June 3, intense combat persisted following the AA joint force's capture of the Natyaykan MPT Pillar hill in Ngaphe Township, Magway Region.

Operations by the KNLA and Joint Forces

On June 3, the KNLA Revolutionary Joint Force launched an attack on the Tha Baw Boe Military Council camp in Myawaddy Township, Karen State, resulting in the deaths of over 30 Military Council soldiers, while 72 others surrendered.

Political Developments

June 1: The Military Council announced the extension of the temporary ceasefire period for one month, from June 1 to June 30, to facilitate peace and reconstruction efforts in earthquake-affected areas, as well as to prepare for upcoming elections.

June 2: The Three Brotherhood Alliance declared an extension of the ceasefire for a third time, lasting one month, to continue supporting humanitarian relief efforts in the aftermath of the earthquake.

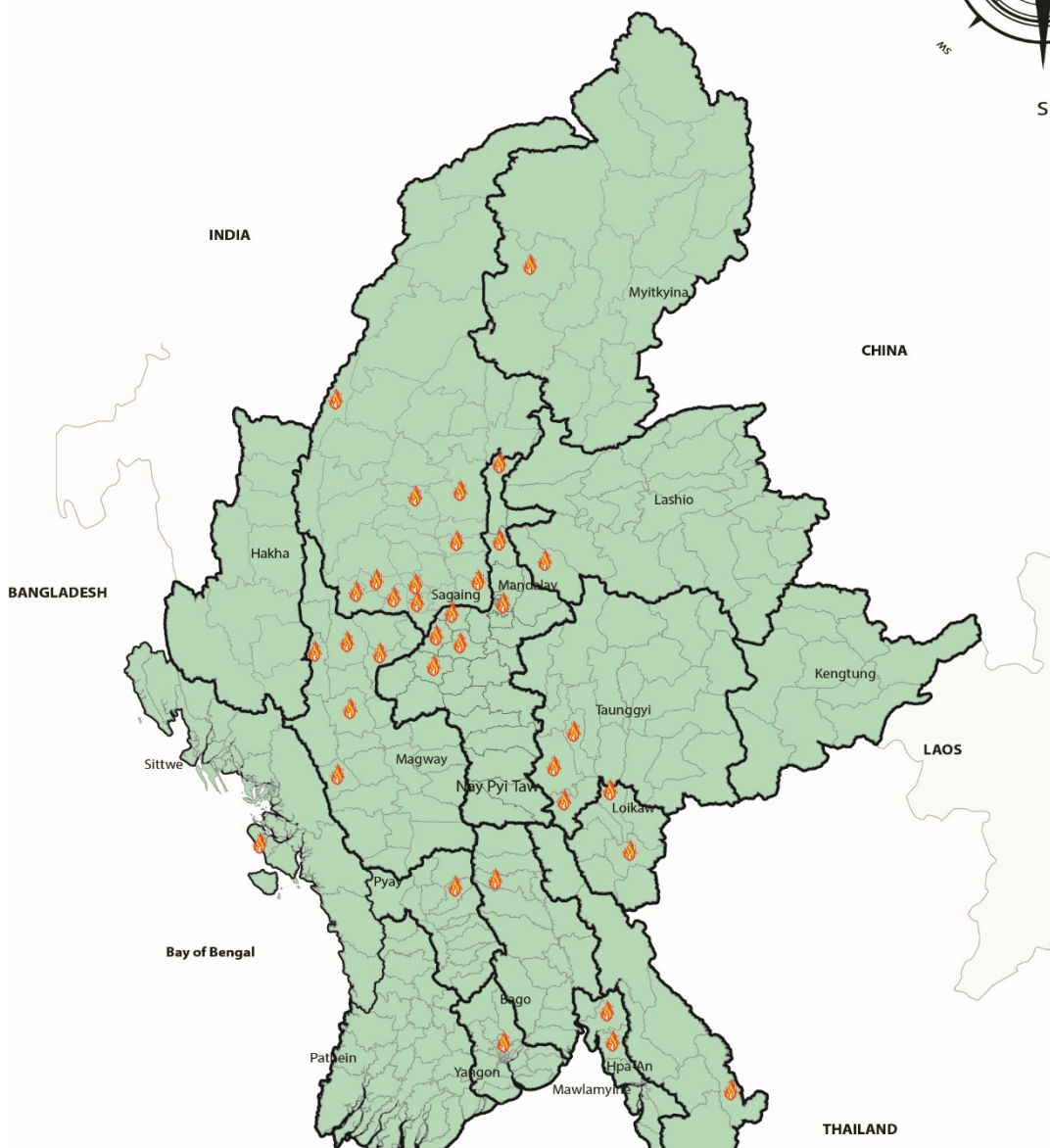
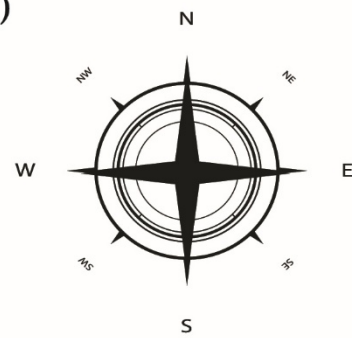
June 5: The 113th International Labour Conference (ILC) in Geneva, Switzerland, decided to impose sanctions on the Military Council under Article 33 of the International Labour Organization (ILO).

June 6: Chinese Ambassador to Myanmar, Ms. Ma Jia, met with General Maung Maung Aye, the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Defense of the Military Council, in Nay Pyi Taw.

Glossary

AAPP (Assistance Association for Political Prisoners)

A human rights organization tracking political prisoners in Myanmar and releasing updates on arrests and killings since the coup.

ABSFU (All Burma Federation of Student Unions)

An organization founded by Aung San at Rangoon University advocating for academic freedom, student rights, and democracy.

ACRP (Asian Conference of Religions for Peace)

A non-governmental organization promoting peace and disarmament issues, affiliated with the UN.

AA (Arakan Army)

An ethnic armed organization based in Rakhine State and the military wing of the United League of Arakan.

ARSA (Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army)

A Rohingya insurgent group active in northern Rakhine State, originally called Harakah al-Yaqin.

Aung San

The founder of Myanmar's Armed Forces, an independence hero, and the Father of the Nation of modern-day Myanmar.

Aung San Suu Kyi (ASSK)

A Nobel Laureate, democracy icon, and former leader of the National League for Democracy, currently imprisoned by the junta.

Burma Socialist Programme Party (BSPP)

The only legal party after the 1962 coup, dissolved in 1988, and a precursor to the National Unity Party.

CDM (Civil Disobedience Movement)

A movement initiated by healthcare workers and civil servants opposing the military regime after the 2021 coup.

CRPH (Committee Representing Pyidaungsu Hluttaw)

A body created by ousted parliament members and citizens rejecting the military government's legitimacy.

Gen Z Burma

A youth-led movement campaigning against the military junta.

GSCN (General Strike Committee of Nationalities)

A coalition coordinating anti-coup protests among opposition groups and ethnic forces.

Junta

A military or political group ruling a country after seizing power by force.

MEHL (Myanmar Economic Holdings Public Company Limited)

A conglomerate owned and operated by Myanmar's military.

MEC (Myanmar Economic Corporation)

Another conglomerate owned and managed by Myanmar's military was targeted by the CDM.

Min Aung Hlaing

The military commander-in-chief was internationally condemned for his role in military attacks on ethnic minorities.

Ministry of Communications, Posts, and Telegraphs

The junta-controlled ministry is responsible for restricting freedom of speech and press.

Myint Swe

A vice president who declared a state of emergency during the coup and transferred power to Min Aung Hlaing.

Myo Yan Naung Thein

A pro-democracy advocate, former NLD strategist, and ex-political prisoner.

NLD (National League for Democracy)

A liberal democratic political party was overthrown in the 2021 military coup after winning the 2020 elections.

NUG (National Unity Government)

An exiled government formed by the CRPH, composed of ousted MPs and ethnic leaders opposing the junta.

NUCC (National Unity Consultative Council)

A platform uniting forces for a federal democracy, including NLD members, CDM groups, and civil society organizations.

PDF (People's Defense Force)

The armed wing of the NUG defended civilians and was seen as a precursor to a Federal Union Army.

Rohingya

A stateless, persecuted ethnic group in Myanmar's Rakhine State, victims of genocide by the military.

SAC (State Administration Council)

The name of the military-appointed junta government.

SAC-M (Special Advisory Council for Myanmar)

An international group promoting human rights, democracy, and accountability in Myanmar.

Spring Revolution

A nationwide protest movement against the 2021 military coup.

Tatmadaw

The military forces of Myanmar, are regarded by many as a terrorist organization.

UEC (Union Election Commission)

The junta accused the government body overseeing elections of failing to prevent alleged voter fraud in 2020.

Union Solidarity and Development Party (USDP)

The military's proxy political party, which lost to the NLD in 2020.

UNHRC (United Nations Human Rights Council)

A global organization promoting and protecting human rights worldwide.

United Nations International Court of Justice (ICJ)

The judicial organ of the UN is tasked with preventing genocidal acts against the Rohingya.

22222

The massive general strike held on February 22, 2022, showed widespread discontent against the junta.

8888 (8/8/88)

The historic uprising on August 8, 1988, was organized against the military junta, inspiring later movements like the 22222 strike.

969 Movement

A Buddhist extremist nationalist movement opposing Islam in Myanmar and supporting the military.
