Civilian Casualties

In June 2026, 163 civilians were killed in airstrikes and artillery attacks carried out by the military junta across Myanmar. These included 24 children and 23 women. Magway Region recorded the highest number of deaths, with 38. Sagaing Region had 37, Rakhine State had 19, Bago Region had 15, Chin State and Mandalay Region had 14 each, Mon State had 9, Kachin State and Tanintharyi Region had 7 each, and Karenni State had 3.

Civilian's Houses Burnt Down

In June, 554 houses were burned down by the military junta in two states and five regions in Myanmar. These included 194 houses in Magway Region, 162 houses in Sagaing Region, 80 houses in Karenni State, 70 houses in Bago Region, 27 houses in Tanintharyi Region, 12 houses in Chin State, and 9 houses in Mandalay Region.

Civilian Arrest

In June 2026, the military junta arrested 230 innocent civilians in four states and six regions across Myanmar. These included 111 in Sagaing Region, 60 in Magway Region, 17 each in Mon State and Rakhine State, 9 in Yangon Region, 6 in Irrawaddy Region, 5 in Mandalay Region, 2 each in Karenni State and Southern Shan State, and one in Bago Region.

Aerial Assaults Against Civilian Targets

The military junta conducted 537 airstrikes across Myanmar in June: 227 in Chin State, 109 in Magway Region, 50 in Sagaing Region, 39 in Rakhine State, 38 in Mon State, 16 in Southern Shan State, 15 in Kachin State, 12 in Bago Region, 10 each in Karenni and Tanintharyi Regions, 5 in Karen State, 4 in Mandalay Region, and 2 in northern Shan State.

Conflicts and Casualties of Combatants

In June 2026, there were 189 major and minor clashes, including drone strikes, with Magway Region experiencing the highest number at 33. Chin State followed with 31. Rakhine State had 26, Bago Region 16, Karen State 14, Sagaing Region 13, Tanintharyi Region 12, Irrawaddy Region, Kachin State and Mandalay Region 11 each, southern Shan State 8, northern Shan State 2, and Karenni State 1. Mon State and Yangon Region had no clashes.

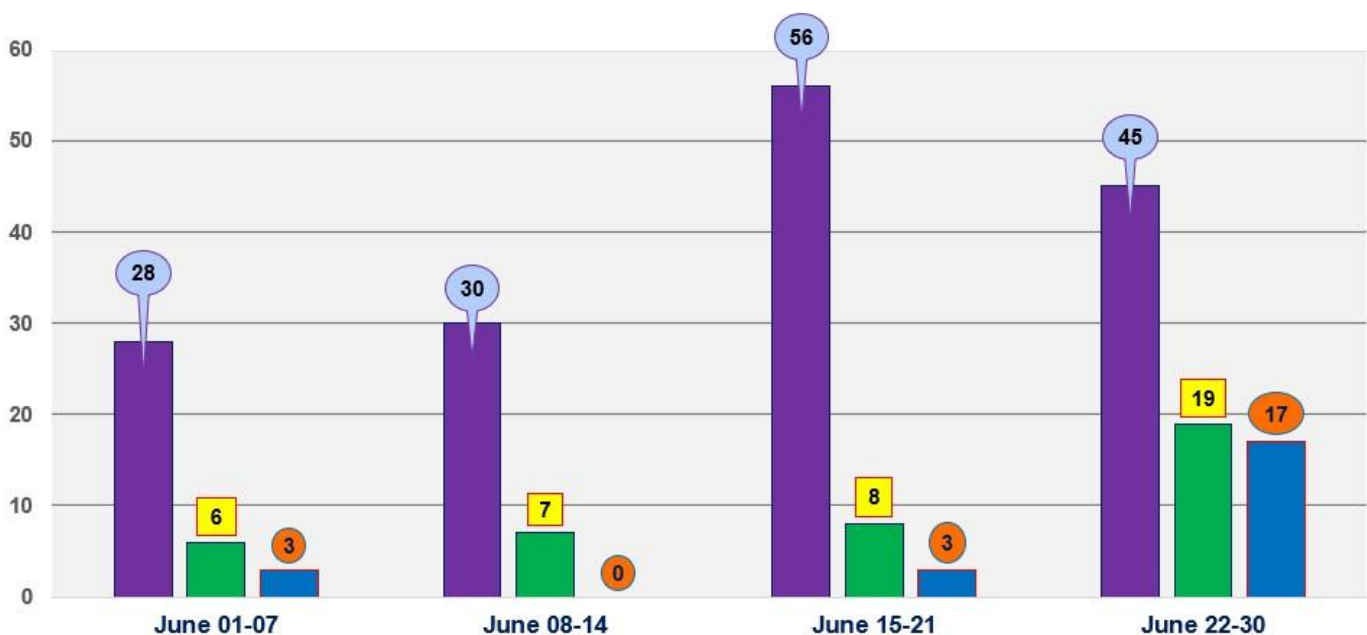
In June, 507 junta soldiers were killed in fighting. The highest number was in Magway Region, where 169 were killed. Bago Region recorded 78, Sagaing Region 77, Mandalay Region and southern Shan State 44 each, Tanintharyi Region 22, Kachin State and Rakhine State 20 each, Chin State 15, Irrawaddy Region 11, and Karen State 7. A total of 31 fighters of Resistance Forces were killed in May.

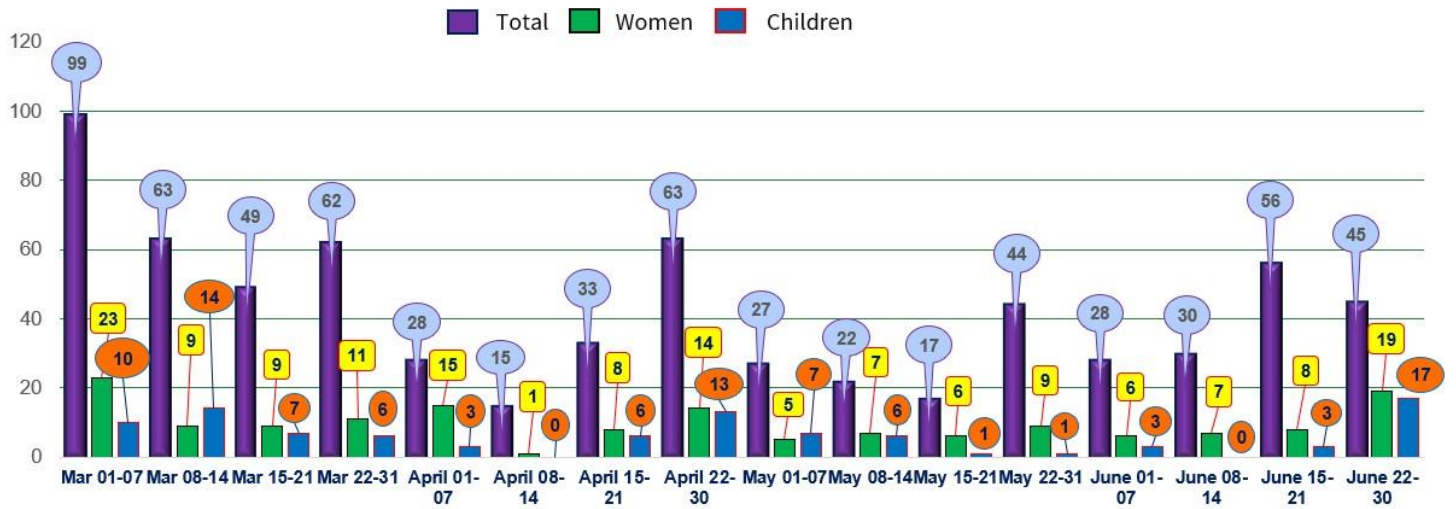
Civilian, Women, and Children Deaths

■ Total ■ Women ■ Children



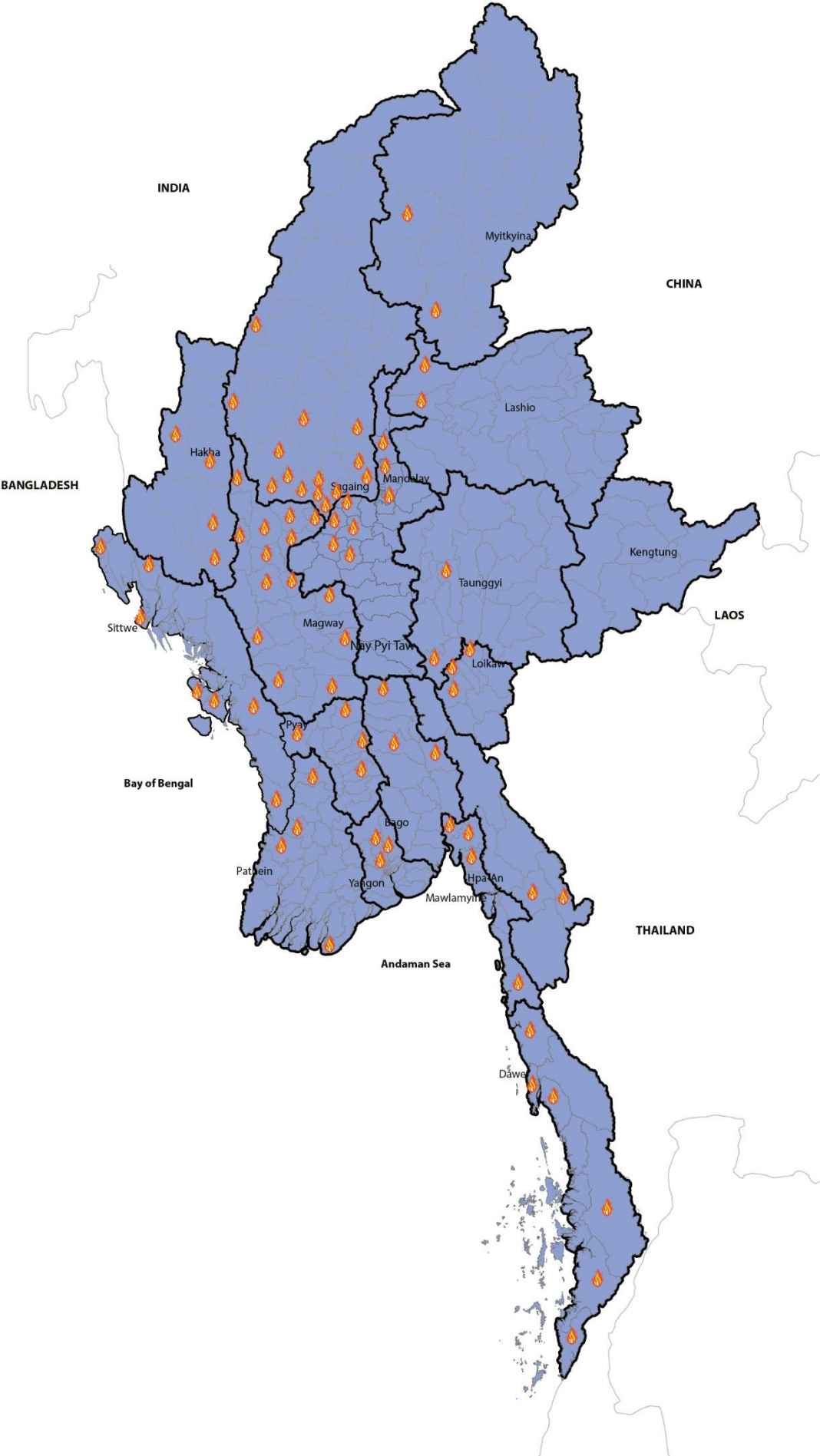
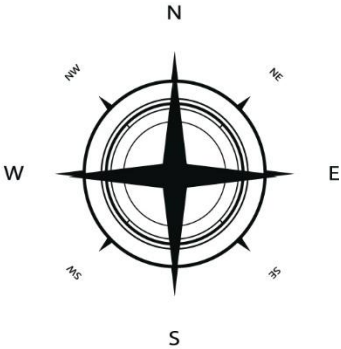
Civilian, Women, and Children Deaths (Last 4 Months)

Glossary

AAPP (Assistance Association for Political Prisoners)

A human rights organization tracking political prisoners in Myanmar and releasing updates on arrests and killings since the coup.

ABSFU (All Burma Federation of Student Unions)

An organization founded by Aung San at Rangoon University advocating for academic freedom, student rights, and democracy.

ACRP (Asian Conference of Religions for Peace)

A non-governmental organization promoting peace and disarmament issues, affiliated with the UN.

AA (Arakan Army)

An ethnic armed organization based in Rakhine State and the military wing of the United League of Arakan.

ARSA (Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army)

A Rohingya insurgent group active in northern Rakhine State, originally called Harakah al-Yaqin.

Aung San

The founder of Myanmar's Armed Forces, an independence hero, and the Father of the Nation of modern-day Myanmar.

Aung San Suu Kyi (ASSK)

A Nobel Laureate, democracy icon, and former leader of the National League for Democracy, currently imprisoned by the junta.

Burma Socialist Programme Party (BSPP)

The only legal party after the 1962 coup, dissolved in 1988, and a precursor to the National Unity Party.

CDM (Civil Disobedience Movement)

A movement initiated by healthcare workers and civil servants opposing the military regime after the 2021 coup.

CRPH (Committee Representing Pyidaungsu Hluttaw)

A body created by ousted parliament members and citizens rejecting the military government's legitimacy.

Gen Z Burma

A youth-led movement campaigning against the military junta.

GSCN (General Strike Committee of Nationalities)

A coalition coordinating anti-coup protests among opposition groups and ethnic forces.

Junta

A military or political group ruling a country after seizing power by force.

MEHL (Myanmar Economic Holdings Public Company Limited)

A conglomerate owned and operated by Myanmar's military.

MEC (Myanmar Economic Corporation)

Another conglomerate owned and managed by Myanmar's military was targeted by the CDM.

Ministry of Communications, Posts, and Telegraphs

The junta-controlled ministry is responsible for restricting freedom of speech and press.

Myo Yan Naung Thein

A pro-democracy advocate, former NLD strategist, and ex-political prisoner.

NLD (National League for Democracy)

A liberal democratic political party was overthrown in the 2021 military coup after winning the 2020 elections.

NUG (National Unity Government)

An exiled government formed by the CRPH, composed of ousted MPs and ethnic leaders opposing the junta.

NUCC (National Unity Consultative Council)

A platform uniting forces for a federal democracy, including NLD members, CDM groups, and civil society organizations.

PDF (People's Defense Force)

The armed wing of the NUG defended civilians and was seen as a precursor to a Federal Union Army.

Rohingya

A stateless, persecuted ethnic group in Myanmar's Rakhine State, victims of genocide by the military.

SAC (State Administration Council)

The name of the military-appointed junta government.

SAC-M (Special Advisory Council for Myanmar)

An international group promoting human rights, democracy, and accountability in Myanmar.

Spring Revolution

A nationwide protest movement against the 2021 military coup.

Tatmadaw

The military forces of Myanmar, are regarded by many as a terrorist organization.

UEC (Union Election Commission)

The junta accused the government body overseeing elections of failing to prevent alleged voter fraud in 2020.

Union Solidarity and Development Party (USDP)

The military's proxy political party, which lost to the NLD in 2020.

UNHRC (United Nations Human Rights Council)

A global organization promoting and protecting human rights worldwide.

United Nations International Court of Justice (ICJ)

The judicial organ of the UN is tasked with preventing genocidal acts against the Rohingya.

22222

The massive general strike held on February 22, 2022, showed widespread discontent against the junta.

8888 (8/8/88)

The historic uprising on August 8, 1988, was organized against the military junta, inspiring later movements like the 22222 strike.

969 Movement

A Buddhist extremist nationalist movement opposing Islam in Myanmar and supporting the military.
