



Myanmar Weekly Conflict Update (August 08 - 14, 2026)

Violence Against Civilians

Civilian Casualties

In the second week of July, 16 civilians were killed in airstrikes and artillery attacks carried out by the military junta across three states and five regions in Myanmar, including one child and four women.

Civilian's Houses Burnt Down

In the second week of July, 118 houses were burned down by the military junta in 1 state and 3 regions in Myanmar. 100 houses in Magway Region, 12 houses in Mon State, 5 houses in Tanintharyi Region, and 1 house in Bago Region.

Civilian Arrest

Civilian Arrest In the second week of July, 84 civilians were arrested in five regions of Myanmar. Seventy in Tanintharyi Region, six in Irrawaddy Region, four in Magway Region, three in Yangon Region, and one in Mandalay Region.

Aerial Assaults Against Civilian Targets

In the second week of July, the military junta conducted 89 airstrikes in five states and four regions in Myanmar. These included 30 in Chin State, 25 in Magway Region, 13 in Rakhine State, seven in Sagaing Region, five in Karen State, four in Kachin State, three in Tanintharyi Region, and one each in Bago Region and Karenni State.

Civilian Killed

In the second week of July, 16 civilians were killed in three states and five regions in Myanmar. Four in Rakhine State, three in Magway Region, two each in Bago, Irrawaddy, and Sagaing Regions, and one each in Chin State, Northern Shan State, and Tanintharyi Region.

Conflicts and Casualties of Combatants

During the second week of July 2026, there were 63 major and minor clashes, including drone strikes. Mandalay Region recorded the highest number of clashes, with 17. Karen State had the second highest, with 12. Sagaing Region had 11, Kachin State had nine, and Magway Region, Mon State, Rakhine State, and Southern Shan State had three each. Bago Region and Tanintharyi Region had one each. Chin State, Irrawaddy Region, Karenni State, Northern Shan State, and Yangon Region reported no clashes.

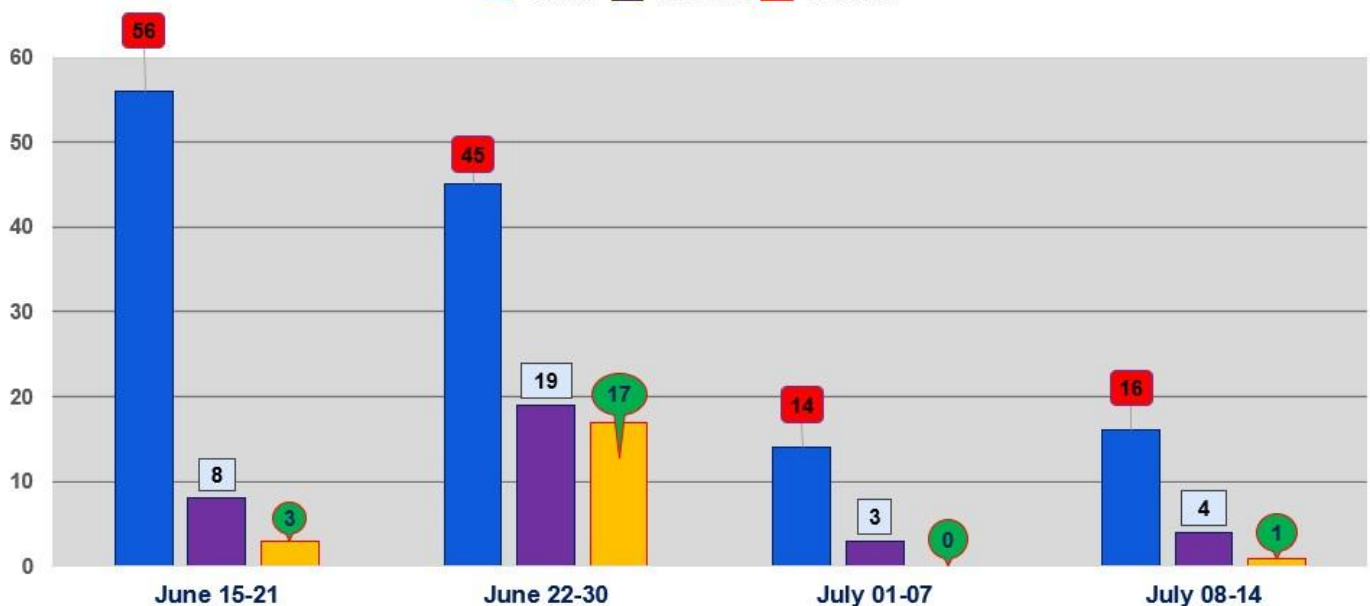
During the second week of July, 115 junta soldiers and 20 comrades from the Revolutionary Joint Force were killed in fighting.

All information provided is based on local news reports published between July 08th and 14th 2026.

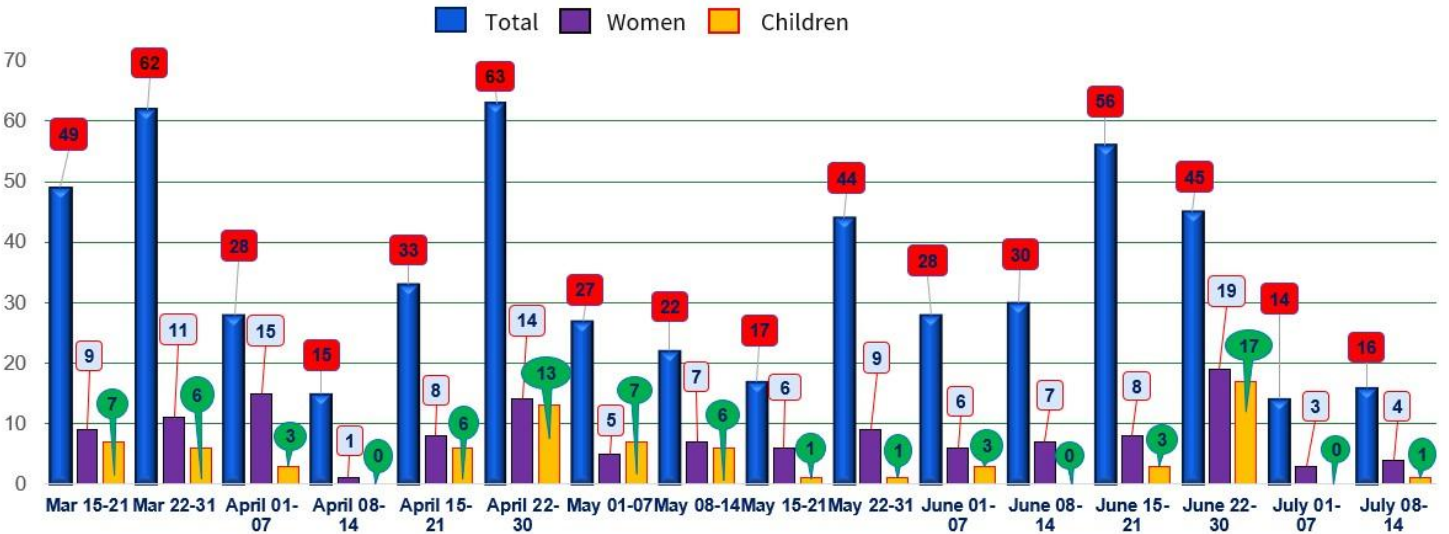
Civilian, Women, and Children Deaths

Military Developments

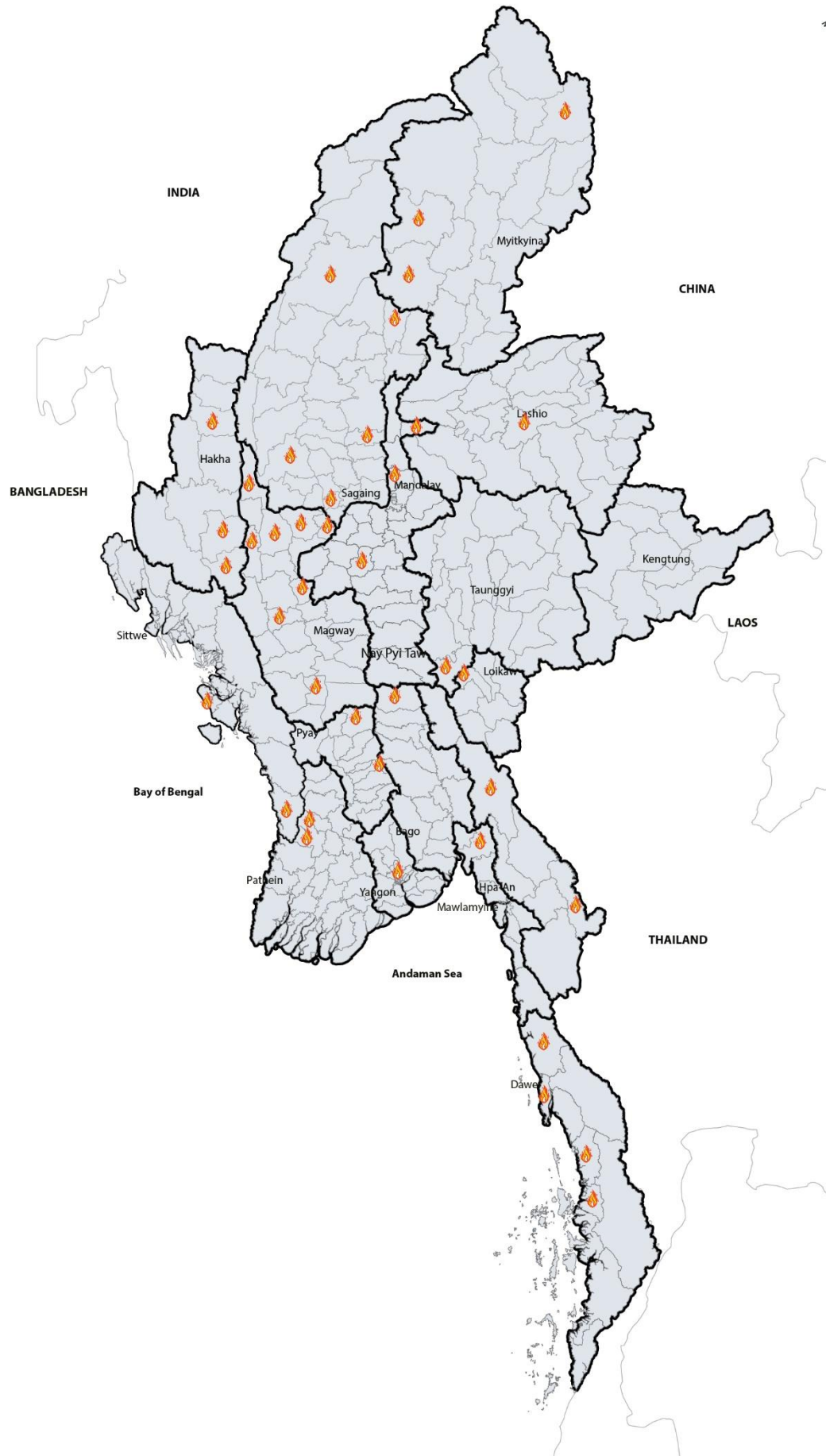
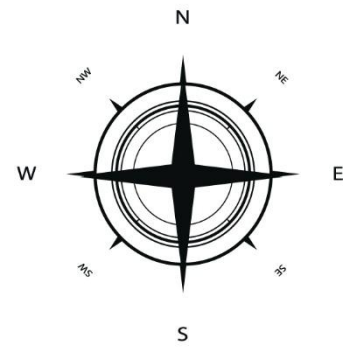
Operations by AA and Joint Forces

On July 10, the Kachin Independence Army (KIA) attacked and captured two military bases belonging to the military junta and militia forces in the Khaung Lan Phu area of Putao District, Kachin State, killing more than 20 soldiers and seizing 15 weapons along with large quantities of ammunition.

Glossary

AAPP (Assistance Association for Political Prisoners)

A human rights organization tracking political prisoners in Myanmar and releasing updates on arrests and killings since the coup.

ABSFU (All Burma Federation of Student Unions)

An organization founded by Aung San at Rangoon University advocating for academic freedom, student rights, and democracy.

ACRP (Asian Conference of Religions for Peace)

A non-governmental organization promoting peace and disarmament issues, affiliated with the UN.

AA (Arakan Army)

An ethnic armed organization based in Rakhine State and the military wing of the United League of Arakan.

ARSA (Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army)

A Rohingya insurgent group active in northern Rakhine State, originally called Harakah al-Yaqin.

Aung San

The founder of Myanmar's Armed Forces, an independence hero, and the Father of the Nation of modern-day Myanmar.

Aung San Suu Kyi (ASSK)

A Nobel Laureate, democracy icon, and former leader of the National League for Democracy, currently imprisoned by the junta.

Burma Socialist Programme Party (BSPP)

The only legal party after the 1962 coup, dissolved in 1988, and a precursor to the National Unity Party.

CDM (Civil Disobedience Movement)

A movement initiated by healthcare workers and civil servants opposing the military regime after the 2021 coup.

CRPH (Committee Representing Pyidaungsu Hluttaw)

A body created by ousted parliament members and citizens rejecting the military government's legitimacy.

Gen Z Burma

A youth-led movement campaigning against the military junta.

GSCN (General Strike Committee of Nationalities)

A coalition coordinating anti-coup protests among opposition groups and ethnic forces.

Junta

A military or political group ruling a country after seizing power by force.

MEHL (Myanmar Economic Holdings Public Company Limited)

A conglomerate owned and operated by Myanmar's military.

MEC (Myanmar Economic Corporation)

Another conglomerate owned and managed by Myanmar's military was targeted by the CDM.

Ministry of Communications, Posts, and Telegraphs

The junta-controlled ministry is responsible for restricting freedom of speech and press.

Myo Yan Naung Thein

A pro-democracy advocate, former NLD strategist, and ex-political prisoner.

NLD (National League for Democracy)

A liberal democratic political party was overthrown in the 2021 military coup after winning the 2020 elections.

NUG (National Unity Government)

An exiled government formed by the CRPH, composed of ousted MPs and ethnic leaders opposing the junta.

NUCC (National Unity Consultative Council)

A platform uniting forces for a federal democracy, including NLD members, CDM groups, and civil society organizations.

PDF (People's Defense Force)

The armed wing of the NUG defended civilians and was seen as a precursor to a Federal Union Army.

Rohingya

A stateless, persecuted ethnic group in Myanmar's Rakhine State, victims of genocide by the military.

SAC (State Administration Council)

The name of the military-appointed junta government.

SAC-M (Special Advisory Council for Myanmar)

An international group promoting human rights, democracy, and accountability in Myanmar.

Spring Revolution

A nationwide protest movement against the 2021 military coup.

Tatmadaw

The military forces of Myanmar, are regarded by many as a terrorist organization.

UEC (Union Election Commission)

The junta accused the government body overseeing elections of failing to prevent alleged voter fraud in 2020.

Union Solidarity and Development Party (USDP)

The military's proxy political party, which lost to the NLD in 2020.

UNHRC (United Nations Human Rights Council)

A global organization promoting and protecting human rights worldwide.

United Nations International Court of Justice (ICJ)

The judicial organ of the UN is tasked with preventing genocidal acts against the Rohingya.

22222

The massive general strike held on February 22, 2022, showed widespread discontent against the junta.

8888 (8/8/88)

The historic uprising on August 8, 1988, was organized against the military junta, inspiring later movements like the 22222 strike.

969 Movement

A Buddhist extremist nationalist movement opposing Islam in Myanmar and supporting the military.
